What the participants thought of the co-creation process

94% felt actively involved

86% felt motivated

89% learned from other people

86% would like to do it again

84% feel more confident

95% said that everyone was respectful of each other

77% thought the project had changed their ideas

75% said that taking part was good for their wellbeing

There was a sense of community while we were doing everything.

I met so many new people and I learnt so many things it's all new for me but I really love it.

What audiences thought

93% 'It was well made and performed'

I learned, not to sing, but to give meaning to what I sang.

82% 'It was different from anything I've seen before'

80% 'It was about things that really matter to me'

'If someone told me I would be singing at the Liceu at 78 years of age, I'd say "You're crazy", but it was very good.' I'd do it again right now. Right now. With the pros and cons. I'd do it again, right away. 'It was a new thing for me, it was a good experience. We learned new things that's the most important thing.'

> 'This understanding that we all had is honestly one of the most positive things to come out of this.'

'The opera became the good bit we spent in here and that for us was a relief. We're very grateful that it happened that way and gave us the opportunity.'

Traction was a research project to explore how new digital tools could support the co-creation of new operas with communities in Barcelona, Portugal and Ireland. Between 2020 and 2022, artists and researchers worked on co-creation, social inclusion, digital technologies and learning.
